# Worshipful Master's Message

Greetings from the East Brothers!

A long time ago in a land not far away from here (on the south part of Florida Tech's campus) I was up on a rappelling tower looking down. The 30+ feet looked a lot farther away than it actually was and the light breeze felt like jet exhaust as I looked over, waiting for my turn. I didn't realize I was afraid of heights until I was presented with the opportunity to willingly "fall/jump" off the side of a tower. Well it happened and I lived. Later in my early professional life, I jumped out of airplanes for fun and enjoyed a few helicopter rides with the doors open. All it took was a willingness to take that first step off the ledge- because it was a requirement to eventually be somewhere better. Bad things could happen when gravity is involved more than usual, but when you're presented with failing to chase a lifetime goal or the fear of the possibilities...why would you let fear win?

We're running into a similar situation with the lodge: between the budget, the building, fundraising and dues, we've reached a decision point on our next steps as a brotherhood at the building on Avocado Ave. In April we will vote on whether to STAY or GO in the coming year. This is a majority vote. This vote gives the lodge a focus. No more kicking the can down the road or hoping for a financial miracle—we choose our own path before circumstance chooses it for us.

A vote to GO means we will create two new committees: one focused on maximizing the value from the building proceeds and another focused on our relocation and the prerequisite coordination. A GO vote doesn't mean we move in the next week, there are by-law changes, a 75% vote required to actually sell the building once a suitable offer is selected, and negotiations that must take place with external parties.

A vote to STAY also creates two new committees: one focused on Fundraising/Membership, and another focused on Sustainability/Maintenance. Fundraising and membership efforts are extremely necessary given our annual fiscal shortfall. The Sustainability and Maintenance Committee will focus on finding ways to ensure structural costs and future maintenance requirements are planned for and met WITHIN our current dues structure (especially since the motion to raise dues was soundly rejected in late 2025).

My intent is for discussion to occur during our March 10th and March 24th stated communications so we can proceed directly to a vote on April 14th with limited further discussion. We've been discussing this as a craft for years; in April it's time to make a decision.

On a more fun note, we had a great picnic food competition this week and I am looking forward to our St. Patrick's Day meal on 14 March! Corned Beef, Cabbage and all the good Irish stuff! Tickets will be on sale for \$20 per person or \$35 for a couple but I want to make it clear to everyone: cost should not prevent you from joining this event. Talk to me before deciding you can't do it.

Looking forward to seeing you and having some productive conversations this month!
